

SYNOPSIS

Antigone buries her brother, Polynices, against Creon's decree. Antigone, and all of those around her, must face the consequences. How do gender roles and autonomy affect our choices? Is it ever right to break the laws even if you believe they are unjust? Are laws made fairly? Our version of ANTIGONE is based on that written by Jean Anouilh in 1944 Nazi-occupied France, and translated by Robertson Dean in 2015, but is set in our vast backyard of Wyoming in 1969, against the backdrop of the Vietnam war, women's rights, civil rights, and protest era. We hope by looking back at our history, we can learn from Antigone's plight.

DIRECTORS' NOTE

What is visibility? How are we taught to take up space? How is taking up space informed by our identity? Who is allowed to take up more space than others and why?

These are some of the questions we asked ourselves as we began the creative process of directing and devising this 1969 Wyoming adaptation of ANTIGONE. Our collaborators elucidated some enlightening research about what Laramie, Wyoming, was like during this time. For instance, women were scolded for wearing pants, and wearing pants was a sign of protest. Moreover, our university encountered some blatant discrimination with The Black 14. (If you don't know what this is, take this moment to look it up).

Devising is a broad term in theatre-making, meaning "creating something from nothing." Starting with the text, we found ourselves curious as to ways we could tell the story without dialogue, using movement, chairs, and spatial relationships between bodies on stage. Devising also allows for a more collaborative process between actors and designers. Some rehearsals, we came in with a concrete plan, and other rehearsals, we solicited ideas from the actors on stage. Many of the devised moments you will see are student-created. We came into the process wanting our actors to feel ownership and autonomy of their ideas and bodies. A concept Antigone might not have full access to, as a woman, navigating Creon's world.

We hope the legacy of Antigone continues presently. How can we see or hear her story? We think our clues lie in Wyoming's wind and those who constantly fight for equality. We are The Equality State, after all.




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
